Health and Safety Requirements

CGW and the Costume College Committee are committed to providing a safe environment for all of our teachers, students, vendors, and committee members. As such, we will be following all current masking, vaccine and/or testing requirements, per state laws, regulations, and ordinances, local laws, regulations, and ordinances, and hotel policies. We greatly appreciate everyone's commitment to helping us provide a safe environment for all of our attendees.

As of December 1, 2022:

We will NOT be requiring proof of COVID vaccination or recent negative PCR COVID test to attend Costume College, the Time Traveler's Gala, or the Sunday Tea. We encourage all attendees to be up to date on all vaccinations prior to attending Costume College.

We will NOT be requiring the wearing of masks. However, we recommend the wearing of properly fitting face masks in all classrooms, on all tours, in the Marketplace, and in the Bargain Basement. The CDC recommends wearing surgical masks or higher-level respirators (e.g., N95s, KN95s, KF94s) with good fit.

Since the wearing of a mask is optional, please treat others with consideration and respect as everyone navigates their own masking preferences. Yelling, berating, and/or verbal abuse of any kind is considered harassment and will not be tolerated.

Any participant at Costume College 2024, including all teachers, students, vendors, and volunteers, who harasses others over wearing masks will be asked to leave the event (including the Gala and the Tea) and will not be refunded.

Introducing the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel in Los Angeles, CA

We're returning to the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel (LAX) located at 6101 W. Century Boulevard, Los Angeles, CA 90045.

The Sheraton LAX is conveniently located less than one mile from the Los Angeles International Airport. The 4-star hotel offers free, 24-hour shuttle services to and from the terminals, helping you minimize stress and streamline your travel. For those traveling by car the hotel is easily accessed off of the I-405 freeway by car. Additional amenities include a fitness center, resort-style outdoor pool with several private cabanas, and several restaurants, a new small cafe, and bars specializing in California cuisine and craft cocktails.

Is it worth staying at the hotel?

Yes! It is absolutely worth it to stay at the hotel for the weekend. Much of your Costume College experience comes from the spontaneous things that happen during the run of Costume College that are not on any schedule, from impromptu discussions in the hallways to early morning chats over coffee before getting in line for Sunday's Bargain Basement Sale.

Staying at the hotel allows you to:

- · Have a convenient place to change before the Friday Night Social, Gala and/or Tea;
- Have a convenient place to store all the stuff you bring to Costume College and all the purchases you make from the Marketplace;
- · Enjoy the hotel's pool, work-out room, cocktail lounge, restaurant, and cafe; and
- Lets you relax and enjoy the weekend without driving home LATE or getting up extra early to make it to a class on time.

Costume College has a discounted rate of \$169 plus tax per room/per night. Our special room rate accommodates single to quadruple occupancy. The discounted rate is good for stays July 16, 2024 through July 23, 2024 based on availability.

This rate includes:

- Complimentary in-room Wireless Internet access;
- Complimentary access to the business center and print services; and
- Discounted Valet parking with in/out privilege (subject to availability).

All rooms include mini refrigerators, irons, ironing boards, hairdryer, and coffeemakers. Microwave ovens are available upon request, though supplies are limited therefore not all requests may be filled.

Rollaways are available at an additional \$10 flat rate per night, for king bedded rooms only (not double bedded rooms). Please inquire with the hotel for availability; first come, first serve basis.

For those of you planning on hosting guests in your rooms during the evening and into the late night, please try and book a room on the higher floors. This is to ensure that we are not disturbing any other guests in the hotel, as we will not have an "Entertainment Floor" officially designated.


How to Make Hotel Reservations

Hotel reservations are made using the link included in your Costume College registration confirmation letter directly to the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel. Costume College has discounted room rates (see above). To receive the discounted rate, please use the reservation link included in your registration confirmation email. To insure you receive the discounted rate, book your room before Monday, June 17, 2024. Please note: any reservations made after June 17, 2024, are subject to availability and at prevailing room rates.

Please do not reserve more rooms than you will actually use. If sharing a room with roommates please have only ONE person in the room make a reservation.

Cancellations: Due to the demand for hotel rooms as well as CGW's fiscal need to ensure that booked rooms stay filled (otherwise CGW is required to pay for them) a non-refundable one-night cancellation fee will be charged to hotel reservations that are canceled after June 17, 2024.

Parking at the Hotel

Self Parking: Self parking behind the hotel is available to all, you do not need to be a guest of the hotel. The Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel's parking is provided by Skyview Center Parking and is located at 6101 W. 98th St., directly BEHIND the hotel. The daily/overnight parking rate is \$24.00 (inclusive), per night, no in-and-out service. Parking fees are paid at the kiosk near the exit. The kiosk accepts all major credit cards.

Valet Parking: Alternatively, you may valet park directly with the hotel using their valet services for a discounted rate of \$30 per day (regularly \$63 per day) plus tax per car, which includes in-and-out services. This is on a first come, first serve basis and the valet does fill up rather quickly.



What to Wear

Costume College is designed to offer endless opportunities to learn about, create, and show off costumes. However, there is no requirement to wear a costume to any event! Spending the entire weekend in your everyday clothes is perfectly acceptable. Most students find this more comfortable for classes, anyway. If you want to dress up a bit for the events, please feel free — but don't feel pressured.

At major events: Thursday Night Welcome Party, Friday Night Social, Sunday Breakfast, Sunday Fantasy Tea, and especially at Saturday's Time Traveler's Gala costumes are a wonderful way to enhance the event. Remember that at each event you will be walking, maneuvering around tables and chairs, sitting, talking, and often eating and drinking. Test your costume at home if you're not sure it will work in any of these situations.

In the hallways and classrooms: If you want to dress up the rest of the time, please feel free to do so, but above all, be comfortable and be cognizant of the comfort of others. Costume College classes, lectures and workshops are learning experiences, so make sure that your costume — should you choose to wear one — won't detract from another student's experience. You don't want your costume to obstruct the view of the person behind you or cause you to take up three seats in a packed lecture room. Plus, we want YOU to be comfortable. Costumes that are similar to regular street clothes in bulk and agility usually work well. Remember that you may be rushing to eat or get to a class on time, so, when in doubt, wear modern clothes.

Also, no matter what you are wearing, be sure to layer. The hotel can run very warm or very cold, sometimes just between one room and the next. Make sure you have a sweater or wrap if you feel a chill. Keeping the thermostat comfortable for 500+ moving people can be tricky!



Information Desk

If you are unable to bring your own sewing machine, but need one for class, or have last minute touches to finish on your Gala costume, Sewing Machine Warehouse is providing machines to rent! Please look for them in the area next to the Information Desk.

- Which workshop you will be using the machine in (if applicable)
- Your cell phone number during Costume College

When scheduling your rental, please consider that you may want a little extra time before class to unpack the machine, try a few sample stitches, look through the instruction manual, etc. Please include 30 minutes prior to your class and 30 minutes after your workshop in your booking, as you will need time to get everything in order.

Rental Fees:

- \$5 per hour between 8am and 5pm Friday, Saturday or Sunday
- \$25 flat fee Overnight = 5:30pm until 8am the next day Thursday, Friday or Saturday night
- \$75 Weekend = 8am Friday until 5pm Sunday

To submit your costume for display in the Exhibit, please complete the 2024 Costume College Exhibit Submission form by Friday, 6/28/24. A link to the form will be available on the Costume College website on 5/1/24. We require the following information:

- A title for your piece (a character name/source, a very short description, or a name you have bestowed on it).
- A clear and complete photo of the costume, accessories, and/or prop to be displayed.
- A short paragraph describing your work and how it relates to Character, Stage, or Screen (this text will be displayed).

About Costume College Scholarships

Costumer's Guild West, Inc. (CGW) recognizes the need to provide financial support to our students near and far. We understand that it can be difficult to budget Costume College into your life and we want to help. Written Essays: Essay scholarships are awarded by the CGW Scholarship Committee for service to the organization; OR may be awarded to assist due to hardship; OR to encourage costuming with exposure to resources and instruction. Scholarships may be awarded based on one or more of these criteria. You must be at least 18 years old when you use an awarded scholarship. You need not be a U.S. resident to apply. Written essays scholarships for 2025 will open on July 1, 2024!

That "spare" sewing machine and those craft supplies you never got around to using? Donate it all to the Bargain Basement! Please be aware we cannot accept some kinds of items: electronics (electronic sewing machines are ok), spray paints, or any item that would incur a "hazardous waste disposal" fee, badly damaged patterns or books, and really tiny scraps.



Classes! A Student's Guide

The schedule is as accurate as we can make it. We will update the Registration Book and Pull-out Schedules if changes are made, so be sure to check the schedule closer to Costume College. Last minute changes will be posted at the Information Desk and in the Costume College App.

All workshops and lectures end 15 minutes prior to scheduled end time to allow for class change over. E.g., a scheduled one-hour class is actually 45 minutes.

LECTURE CLASSES

- Any registered student of Costume College may attend as many lecture classes as they can fit into the weekend!
- · No sign up necessary.
- Be on time! Lecture classes fill fast!
- Classroom capacity is determined by room size and safety restrictions.
- Make note of the class type and recommended materials (if any).
- We recommend you bring some cash (in small bills, \$1 or \$5) for optional handouts (these can sell out quickly!)

WORKSHOP CLASSES

Workshop classes have a set number of students, allowing teachers to create a more intimate environment for their class. Students sign up and pay for Workshop classes in advance online about two (2) weeks after Registration opens. All Registered students will be emailed the link to a form on the CGW website inviting them to sign up for Workshops. Only registered Costume College students will be able to sign up for Workshop classes. Available seats after Online Registration is complete may be available at the On-Site Workshop Registration Desk during Costume College in the Prefunction Foyer on the ground floor (see back map), Thursday, July 18, 7:00pm-8:30pm. To ensure an equal chance for all students, you must pick-up your Check-in materials first and then may only sign up for one (1) Workshop each time you go through the line. You may only purchase On-site Workshops for yourself (or an accompanying minor). To secure your seat, you will need to pay for your class on the spot either by cash or check.

Remember, while the Workshop classes are always fun and exciting, there are a huge number of other things to see and do!

Things to Remember About Workshop Classes:

- · Workshop classes are not transferable. You may not give away or sell your seat to anyone else.
- Please do not approach teachers to ask if you can attend a class you are not enrolled in or if you can "sit quietly in the back and watch."
- It is at the teachers' discretion whether to provide you with a refund if you cancel after May 31, 2024.

Class Formats:

In order for all students to get the most out of the workshops, please register for workshops within your skill level only. The following skill level descriptions will help to determine which classes are best suited for you. Remember, an advanced student can learn new tips and techniques from classes of all skill levels, but beginners may struggle in advanced classes and ruin the experience for others.

Skill Level Description

All: Enjoyable and accessible to all attendees.

Beginners: Designed for those with little or no previous sewing or other applicable experience.

Intermediate: Requires basic knowledge in the topic, such as ability to construct a garment from a

commercial pattern.

Advanced: Requires specialized knowledge. Please see the class description for specific requirements.

Tips to get the most out of your classes:

- · Taking notes helps reinforce your learning experience, and provide a handy reference long after the class is over.
- · You may take photographs with the permission of the teacher.
- Audio or video taping of any kind is strictly prohibited, unless specifically allowed by the instructor.
- As a student, please keep comments, personal stories, and/or experiences to a minimum, unless requested by the teacher. Ask your questions during the time designated by the instructor.
- Our teachers are graciously volunteering their time to be a part of the conference. Please let them know you
 appreciate their hard work!
- Find yourself wanting to attend two classes scheduled at the same time? Use the buddy system! Go to one class and trade notes with someone who went to the other one.

Costume College NEW Workshop and Tour Registration Procedure for 2024!

We've heard your complaints and we agree, online workshop registration for Costume College 2023 was a frustrating experience for both students and the programming team. We're doing our best to make it better and more fair this time around. This year, we are returning to a lottery system with some changes!

You will choose a movie which sorts you into one of five groups. Those groups will each be assigned a different day to begin signing up for Workshops and Tours. On your assigned day, the registration forms will open for your assigned group. (You must be signed into your CGW account under the profile you used to register for Costume College).

New Rules - Workshops

- You may select up to three (3) workshops
- · All selected workshops must be for yourself
 - · All workshops must be for your OWN registered student profile
 - · You may not register family or household members
 - Workshop spots are NON-TRANSFERABLE
- You may not register for multiple workshops in the same time slot
 - ALL overlapping workshop selections will be automatically canceled and refunded.

Workshop registration is separate from the Tour registration – there are TWO forms, and each may only be submitted ONCE! At a later date, the workshop and tour forms will re-open for all registered students to sign up for any remaining workshop spots.

New Rules - Tours

- · You may select up to two (2) tours
- All selected tours must be for yourself
 - All tours must be for your OWN registered student profile
 - You may not register family or household members
 - Tour spots are NON-TRANSFERABLE

Refunds policy: Full refund available before May 31, 2024. Refund requests received after June 1, 2024, are at the teacher's discretion.

And now, the question we know everyone will be asking: HOW DOES THE LOTTERY WORK?

All students registering by April 15, 2024 will select from one of five movie titles on the registration form. This choice will determine your group. (The groups have limited numbers to ensure an even distribution.) IMPORTANT: THE GROUPS DO NOT YET HAVE AN ORDER. On April 16, 2024, the groups will be placed in a random order. On April 19, 2024, you will receive an email letting you know which day your group has been assigned (i.e. which day you will be able to access the workshop registration form) along with links to the forms. Workshop and Tour registration will begin for the first group on April 23, 2024 and will open each successive day for the rest of the groups, with the final group gaining access to registration on April 27, 2024.

Frequently asked questions:

You will be able to register for workshops starting on Sunday, April 28th.

I'm a Teacher (or on the Costume College Committee)! How does this affect my registration? The lottery DOES NOT affect workshop registration for Teachers and Committee Members. Teacher and Committee Member Registration will be on April 19th and is not affected by the lottery. You will still be asked to select a movie when registering for Costume College, however this will not change your registration date.

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About Costume College

Costume College is an annual three-day costuming arts conference created and produced by Costumer's Guild West, Inc.

Costume College is a welcoming and non-competitive environment where attendees share and disseminate information/skills.

We offer lectures and workshops on all things costuming: from general sewing (pattern grading, setting sleeves, etc.) to historical construction methods (corsetry, petticoats, etc.) to time period overview classes to science fiction/fantasy costume construction.

All of our classes are taught by volunteers who enjoying sharing their knowledge on a particular topic. Teacher volunteers come from our membership, local costumers and costume designers, industry personnel, costume related business owners, craftspeople specializing in costume related crafts, cosplayers, costume researchers, dress historians and sewing specialists. Invited guest teachers are usually experts in their field and are usually selected based upon their expertise tying in with the theme or bonus track for that particular year.

Along with the opportunity to learn new skills, we offer our attendees several social gatherings to show off their creations! We host a Welcome Party, a Friday Social, a Gala Dinner & Dance, and an Afternoon Tea (the Gala and the Tea each have a separate admission).

We also have a Marketplace filled with fabulous vendors who cater to costumers and an Exhibit Room filled with costumes created by our attendees. Both the Marketplace and Exhibit Room are open to the public and do not require a separate admission.

Costume College is the perfect opportunity to meet people who share a love of costuming!

About Costumers Guild West

Costumer's Guild West, Inc. (CGW) is a 501(c)3, non-profit, volunteer-operated, educational organization dedicated to the art of costuming. We welcome all levels and styles of costumers, whether professional or hobbyist; novice, or master. We are here to encourage, nurture, and educate those who are creating and researching costuming arts including but not exclusive to historical dress, cosplay, and entertainment costuming, encompassed in a safe and supportive environment.

Located in sunny Southern California, our vision is to fill an educational void and encourage hands-on learning in all aspects of the art of costuming. We host lectures and workshops throughout the year; along with tours of costume exhibits and various costumed social events. In addition, we help encourage learning about the costuming arts by working with local museums to sponsor fashion shows and exhibits.

We are the host organization for Costume College®, an annual three-day costuming arts conference. Costume College is a welcoming and non-competitive environment where attendees share and disseminate information/skills. We maintain a Costume College Scholarship program to assist beginning costumers or those in financial need or those who have served CGW. Costume College scholarships may also be awarded during masquerades at local conventions and the costume contest at the Los Angeles County Fair.

CGW is governed by our Board of Directors. The 9-member Board of Directors is comprised of volunteers from our membership who are elected annually at our Annual Membership Meeting. Our Board of Directors meets bi-monthly to oversee the planning of events and the general operations of the organization.

All of our events are planned and organized by volunteers, the smaller of which generally require only couple of volunteers to put together. However, our annual conference, Costume College is planned and organized by a dedicated committee of 30+ volunteers, headed by the Dean and Assistant Dean. If you are interested in volunteering, we will be happy to hear from you.

Costume College Policies

Conferences bring a large group of diverse people together. Even though we all have a love of costumes in common, we come from varying backgrounds. Remember that someone that you see only once or twice a year or have only just met, may have a different comfort level – verbally, visually, and physically – than you do. Please note, these policies are subject to change at any time without notice.

Safety Issues for Conventions

We want everyone to have a safe and enjoyable time at Costume College. The world has become unpredictable as people are acting out in violent manners due to domestic and terror related issues. Large venues can be targets of these events. Your leadership wanted to share ideas with you in case an event like this happens at Costume College or any gathering you may be attending.

If you are in a situation:

RUN: Know where the exits are at the event and have several different escape routes in mind in case your 1st choice is blocked. Once you have reached a safe place away from the incident, call "911" and give Law Enforcement any information that could help First Responders (location, number of suspect(s), suspect(s) description, weapons, any injuries).

HIDE & BARRICADE: If you are unable to exit safely, find a room that can be locked from the inside. Put furniture/items blocking the door. Turn off the lights. Turn off cell phones. Be quiet. Wait till Law Enforcement arrives to escort you to safety.

FIGHT: If confronted with a person trying to harm you, you need to fight for your life. Use anything available to defend/protect yourself (chairs, books, lamps). Control the hand with the weapon. Work as a team to control the suspect. We have not received any threats against our group and do not anticipate you needing to use these tactics but they are good safety precautions to keep in mind. Have a great time at Costume College.

Minor Policy

All Costume College attendees under the age of 18 must present a signed permission form from a parent or guardian to attend. If under the age of 16, the attendee must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who is a registered Costume College attendee to all classes.

Minors who are 16 or 17 do not need to have a parent or guardian attend all the same classes with them, but a parent or guardian must be at the hotel at all times while the minor is in the hotel.

Any attendee under 18 who wishes to attend a Tour must be accompanied by an adult (additional fees will apply). For questions regarding this policy please contact the Student Liaison at cocostudents@gmail.com.

Weapons Policy

Costumes sometimes come in the form of characters with weapons, and in many cases, these weapons look quite real. Convention operations prefers that these items be peace bonded. A peace bond is a very visible lock or tie on a realistic looking weapon to make clear to security and to police that it is not intended to be used for violent purposes. The peace bond will usually come in the form of a zip tie over the trigger such that it couldn't be pulled or holding a bladed weapon in the sheath. If you have a costume with a realistic-looking weapon, please stop into Ops to have them check it.

- · All weapons must conform to state and federal law.
- · All weapons must be non-functional.
- Weapons may not be pointed at another person except in a non-threatening manner for the purposes of exhibition or photographs.
- · Weapons or Costumes that are deemed by Ops to be a safety hazard for any reason will be banned.
- Use of a weapon in an inappropriate, negligent, or threatening manner is forbidden and may result in suspension of membership.

Dress Code

When you are in classes, you don't need to wear a costume, as they can be a distraction to other students and keep you from getting the most out of your class. Dress for comfort. It is always recommended that you have a sweater, jacket, or wrap. Hotels can get very cold.

When donning a costume or deciding what to wear to an event, in the hallways, and public spaces, try to think of Costume College as a PG-13 event. There will be guests in the hotel who are not a part of our event.

Costume College Policies, continued

Code of Conduct and Anti-Harassment Policy

Costumer's Guild West, Inc (CGW) strives to provide an environment where participants can feel safe in expressing their individuality and creativity, free from discrimination, harassment, retaliation, and/or sexual assault. Discrimination or harassment based on race, gender and/or gender identity or expression, color, creed, religion, age, national origin, ethnicity, disability, veteran or military status, sex, sexual orientation, pregnancy, genetic information, marital status, citizenship status, or on any other legally prohibited basis is unlawful and will not be tolerated. Any action or behavior that causes significant interference with event operations, excessive discomfort to other attendees, or adversely affects CGW's relationship with event participants, its venues, or the public is strictly prohibited and may result in removal from the event and/or permanent suspension of membership.

What is harassment?

Harassment is any behavior that causes discomfort or alarms or threatens another person or group. Harassment can take the form of verbal statements, written statements, physical gestures or acts, and other forms of communication. Such statements or acts need not be directed at a particular person or group but may be implied or insinuated. The person experiencing discomfort or alarm can be someone other than those at whom the harassment is directed, such as a bystander or witness, or someone who otherwise discovers an incident of harassment. Here are some examples of harassment:

- Offensive comments about:
 - ✓ Race
 - ✓ Color
 - ✓ Religion (includes religious dress and grooming practices)
 - ✓ Sexuality or gender, regardless of whether the harasser and the person being harassed are of the same or different gender
 - ✓ Gender identity, gender expression
 - ✓ Sexual orientation
 - ✓ Marital status
 - ✓ Medical Condition
 - ✓ Pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, and/or related medical conditions
 - ✓ Military or veteran status
 - ✓ National origin
 - ✓ Ancestry
 - ✓ Disability (mental and physical, including HIV/AIDS, cancer, and genetic characteristics)
 - ✓ Genetic information
 - ✓ Physical appearance or body size
- · This also includes:
 - ✓ Leering, staring, or suggestive gestures
 - ✓ Stalking or following someone around a public area without their consent
 - ✓ Repeated requests for dates or requests for sexual favors
 - ✓ Showing sexual images or carrying out sexual activities in public spaces
 - ✓ Epithets, slurs, negative stereotyping, offensive jokes, or offensive visual materials related to a protected characteristic
 - ✓ Any written, visual, or graphic material that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion to an individual or group because of a protected characteristic
 - ✓ Photographing or recording someone when you have been asked not to
 - ✓ Uninvited physical contact, including touching, grabbing, patting, pinching, hugging, kissing
 - ✓ Threatening to physically attack someone
 - ✓ Sexual assault
 - ✓ Graphic verbal commentaries about an individual's body, sexually degrading words used to describe an individual, or obscene letters, notes, or invitations
 - Harassing communications via letters, phone calls, e-mails, text messaging, or social media
 - ✓ Sustained disruption of classes, talks, or other event
 - Not wearing your mask properly in places where you are required to do so; refusing to wear a mask while in spaces where you are required to do so

What do I do if I am being harassed?

In some cases you may find the harassment stops if you clearly say "no" or "please leave me alone," or simply walk away. We would appreciate it if a Costume College Committee or CGW Board member was informed right away to help us identify any repeat offenders. If you continue to be harassed, don't hesitate to ask for the Dean or the President. We will mediate the situation, help you contact venue security or law enforcement, or otherwise assist you to feel safe during the conference. Costume College will not retaliate against an individual for coming forward with a complaint of harassment.

Costume College Policies, continued

What should I do if I see someone else being harassed?

Ask the person being harassed if they are okay. Offer to help them find an appropriate board or committee member to report the problem to, or stay with them while someone else finds help. During the registration process on site, look for the photos of board and committee members, so you will know who can help in case such a need arises.

What can I do if someone accuses me of harassment?

<u>Participants asked to stop harassing behavior must comply immediately.</u> If someone makes a complaint against you, listen, and be aware that your actions may not have come off as you intended them. If this has occurred, be prepared to apologize, sincerely and without qualifiers. Please understand that, in such a situation, the safety of guests is the highest priority.

Photography

Costume College engages one or more professional photographers who act in an official capacity for the convention. Official Roving Photographers take candid pictures at events, classes, and in public spaces. Official Event Photographers take posed portraits of attendees in a designated area. Candid photos are available after the convention and digital copies are included as part of your registration fee. Posed portrait prints are available on demand at the event for a small fee.

As at any public event, photographs of participants and their guests are taken and posted online. There are so many people taking photos that there is a real possibility that your photograph may be taken by Costume College photographers or attendees and thereafter posted on the Web. By attending Costume College, you give your consent to the posting of such photographs by us or others and waive all rights and claims with respect to the posting of such photographs.

While we have no control over other peoples' websites, Costumer's Guild West, Inc. does not list names with the photos on our website. If you would like a photo posted on the Costume College or CGW website removed, please contact the Web Team at costumecollegeweb@gmail.com and it will be taken down.

It is harassment to continue to photograph someone who specifically asks you not to take photographs of them or their belongings. If someone asks you not to take such a photo, please comply with their request. For more information regarding our harassment policies see our harassment policy.

Unofficial photographers (that is, photographers not officially engaged by Costume College, who may or may not be registered attendees) are allowed at the event. Unofficial photography is limited to the public areas of the convention with the exception of the marketplace. No unofficial/professional photography is allowed in the marketplace due to space/crowd flow issues. Unofficial photography may not disrupt events or impede the flow of foot traffic. Unofficial photographers may not monopolize areas intended to be used as photo ops by all attendees.

Unofficial photographers are not required to purchase registration to Costume College, although they are welcome to do so. An unofficial photographer who has paid registration is welcome to enjoy the event but must follow our general event policies. Unofficial photographers with paid registration may take pictures inside classrooms for personal use only, and then only with the express permission of the individual teacher. An unofficial photographer without paid registration may operate in Costume College's public spaces only.

Unofficial photographers may not use any equipment other than their camera such as tripods, stand lights, free standing light rings, etc. while taking photographs at Costume College.

Unofficial photographers may not charge money at Costume College or in the hotel for their pictures, though they may hand out business cards to attendees. No financial transactions for goods or services may take place between attendees (whether registered or not) onsite.

Unofficial photographers may be asked to cease taking photos or to leave at any time.

Disability Accommodation

It is the policy of the Costumer's Guild West to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA"). We will not discriminate against any attendee of Costume College. We will also reasonably accommodate all attendees with disabilities unless the accommodations would cause an undue hardship to the Costumer's Guild West or the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel.

If you require accommodation for special needs covered under the ADA, you must notify the Costumer's Guild West and/or the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel no later than six (6) weeks before Costume College. Additionally, we will keep the information regarding your condition and special needs confidential. Only those members of the Costumer's Guild West and the Sheraton Gateway Los Angeles Hotel who are in a "need to know" position will be informed of your situation.

Service Animals Accommodation

Dogs are the only service animals allowed at Costume College. If you are bringing a service dog, please notify our Hotel Liaison at <u>cocohotelliaison@yahoo.com</u> no later than six (6) weeks before Costume College.

Your dog will be allowed to be with you in most areas of the hotel, and Costume College, including classrooms, restrooms, the restaurant, lobby, Marketplace, Exhibits, and pool area, etc. However, due to health and safety laws you cannot bring the dog into the pools, or in the gym area.

The handler must maintain control over the dog at all times, either physically by leash, harness or tether, or by voice, signal, or other means. If the dog becomes uncontrollable (including repeated barking), or is not housebroken, the dog must leave the event.

The dog must always be with the handler and cannot be left behind in the hotel room.

If you do bring a service dog, please be considerate and understanding of others' allergies to your dog, or not liking or being afraid of dogs.

Emotional support, therapy, comfort and companion dogs are not considered service animals, and will not be allowed at Costume College. No other animals of any kind will be allowed at Costume College at any time.

Cookies: If you have an account and you log in to this site, we will set a temporary cookie to determine if your browser accepts cookies. This cookie contains no personal data and is discarded when you close your browser.

When you log in, we will also set up several cookies to save your login information and your screen display choices. Login cookies last for two days, and screen options cookies last for a year. If you select "Remember Me," your login will persist for two weeks. If you log out of your account, the login cookies will be removed.

Embedded content from other websites: Articles on our site may include embedded content (e.g. videos, images, articles, etc.). Embedded content from other websites behaves in the exact same way as if the visitor has visited the other website.
